Thanks to the hard work and dedication of Eco Club, Monkfield Park has been awarded the prestigious Eco Schools' Green Flag.

Each year the elected Eco-Club representatives work with Mrs McCarthy to formulate an action plan to raise everyone's awareness of sustainability and to make our school a better place to learn. As part of last year's winning action plan, the children came up with a number of initiatives which have included carrying out frequent litter picks on the school grounds, promoting recycling in the classrooms by collecting paper and cardboard, coordinating walk to school week to promote healthier and more sustainable modes of travel, and encouraging everyone in school to think about conserving water, heat and electricity, in addition to introducing more plants to the school grounds..

We are all incredibly proud of the children's efforts and are grateful to them for leading the way in helping us become a more sustainable school. Mrs McCarthy commented, "applying for Eco-Schools accreditation has been the perfect way to acknowledge, reward and celebrate the ecological achievements of our children. The Green Flag demonstrates that their hard work is appreciated, and it provides them with the confidence and motivation to continue actively working to protect our planet."

The children are already thinking about new initiatives to tackle this year and have been discussing their ideas with Mrs McCarthy in their meetings. ### The Rotten Romans

Do you know what a testudo, a wedge or an orb formation are? Year 4 would be very happy to demonstrate them for you as they had a fantastic WOW day completing lots of fun historical activities and putting their learning about the Romans into action. The children constructed edible Roman roads, practised Roman numerals, designed clay coins of different denominations, created mosaics and practised their marching and battle formations, before re-enacting a classic Roman battle.











### **Keeping Children Safe Online**

The online world gives us access to a huge amount of information and services, but the scale of information available also means that there is content that is inappropriate for children to view. Recently, we have been made aware that some children have been accessing inappropriate films and other content on YouTube which does raise safeguarding concerns for us. What is or isn't appropriate could be based on things like age, ability, beliefs and family values. Parental



controls will allow you to block and filter upsetting or inappropriate content but it is also important that you monitor your children when they are using phones, tablets and other devices as children are always one step ahead of us! The NSPCC advises parents and carers to: plan what time of day your child can go online and for how long so that you can supervise them, create content filters to block apps that may have inappropriate content, and to manage the content different family members can see by having good, strong passwords.
